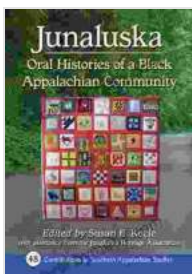

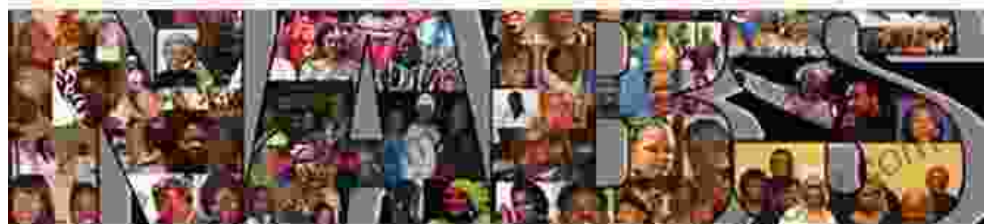

Performer, Podcast Producer, Teaching Artist, Mentor

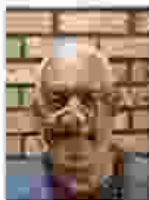

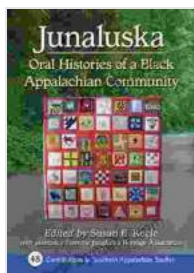
